#### Art Walk in the Park

This year's Art Walk in the Park brought an estimated 3,000 visitors to The Park to browse a variety of food and craft vendors. Sixty vendors lined the path of Tioga Trail and the Tioga Pavilion. Items handmade seasonal decor. jewelry, fiber arts, dog treats and accessories, and plants.

Denise Urban, a Stackhouse Park Board Member, organized the event to showcase the talents of local artists and crafters. Proceeds from raffles donated by participating vendors benefit The Park and will go towards purchasing new equipment, maintaining trails, providing educational programs, and adding a permanent bathroom. Starting in 2020, attendance at the event has increased by nearly 1,000 visitors yearly!

Visitors kept cool in the shade while exploring vendors and listening to upbeat tunes from Strings and Bellows, followed by Nat & Pat. Guests could be seen enjoying water-ice and rice bowls from DaJawn Wit Waterice, pulled pork sandwiches from Red's Texas BBQ, and hummus and vegetables from Balance and sipping on drinks from Disobedient Spirits or a coffee from Mill House Cafe & Co. Some of the other vendors included Kona Ice, Hungry Owl, and Backwoods Kettle Corn.

Children enjoyed blowing giant bubbles, having their faces painted, and crafting. The StoryWalk, located near the Spangler Pavilion, showcased "Betsy the Rescue Dog" by local author Marianne Spampinato. The Dogs of Stackhouse contest featured three categories at the Spangler Pavilion.

A shuttle from Hiram G. Andrews Center, provided by McIlwain School Bus Lines Inc., was very well received after parking became limited at the Westmont Hilltop Elementary School lot. Golf carts driven by volunteers from For Johnstown were available to assist guests with going up and down the trail and assist with carrying purchases.

The first time you see one, you may think it's a beautiful bug.
But, it's a troublesome and invasive pest.

First discovered in Berks
County, PA in 2014, this invasive
planthopper has the potential
to greatly impact the
Pennsylvania grape, hops, and
logging industries. Early
detection is vital for the
protection of Pennsylvania
businesses and agriculture.

How can you help? If you see this pest, squash it and report it to 888-4-BADFLY. Scrape egg masses into a container of rubbing alcohol or hand sanitizer. Before traveling, inspect your vehicle for hitchhiking bugs and egg masses.


